YOUR ONE STOP SHOP

The Visitor Information Centre is open 7 days a week from mid-May to Labour Day.

OUR SURROUNDINGS

WOOD BUFFALO NATIONAL PARK

Minutes from town is the largest national park in Canada.

The Wood Buffalo National Park is over 44,000km² and contains one of the largest free-roaming bison herds in the world.

The Peace-Athabasca Delta, in the southern region of the park, is one of the largest inland freshwater deltas in the world.

The largest Dark-Sky Preserve in the world shares borders with the park and makes it one of the best places to view the Aurora Borealis.

With dozens of trail heads and kilometers of maintained paths, there are hikes for all skill levels and views for all interests.

LOCAL DEMOGRAPHICS

The Northwest Territories is home to roughly 45,000 people. The remote nature of the territory paired with a low population density create the perfect environment for vast, untouched natural wonders.

Over 60% of residents in the Town of Fort Smith are Indigenous Canadians. First Nations, Inuit and Métis people have called this community home for centuries; a testament to the rich cultural landscape.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Wood Buffalo National Park is the only place in North America where the predatorprey relationship between wolves and wood bison has continued, unbroken, over time.



WORLD-CLASS WHITEWATER RAPIDS

The 24km stretch of water from Fort Fitzgerald to Fort Smith contains 4 sets of world-class white water rapids. The water crashes against the granite boulders of the Canadian shield creating eddies and whirlpools that paddler's love.

The Rapids of the Drowned are the closest to Fort Smith, with various safe lookouts that don't require getting wet.

Continuing upstream, the **Mountain Portage Rapids offers** calm coves for swimming, midstream islands that host white pelicans and popular water features for canoes and kayaks.

Pelican Rapids and Cassette Rapids follow afterwards with additional hiking trails, viewing spots and whitewater fun.

LOCAL WILDLIFE

Every year we see the migration of White Pelicans. These birds spend their winters in Texas before flying up to spend summers here.

The spring melts also reveal the northern most population of harmless red-sided garter snakes.

Yellowknife becomes the Capital of the Northwest Territories.

Fort Smith remains the administrative center for Parks Canada.

1974

Northern Life Museum & Cultural Centre opens their doors for visitors.

The Community and Recreation Centre is developed and opened to provide residents with new opportunities.

2021

The Town of Fort Smith commemorates 55+ years of incorporation.



MORE HISTORY

NORTHERN LIFE MUSEUM & CULTURAL CENTRE

The Northern Life Museum & Cultural Centre is regarded as having the most extensive collection of Northern Canadian artifacts anywhere in the Country.

For an immersive experience of early Indigenous life, visit the outdoor Culture Centre where a life sized village showcases a traditional way of living.

To purchase souvenirs made by local artisans, the museum gift shop should be one of your first stops. The shop is continually stocked with beaded goods, tufted baskets, local books and various other handcrafted items.

CANUS, a whooping crane born in Wood Buffalo National Park, is proudly displayed in the museum. This bird has significant history and was responsible for assisting scientists in repopulating the whooping crane population.

THE DARKEST SKY

A SKY ALIVE WITH LIGHT

The night skies over Fort Smith offer some of the most intense viewing of the Aurora Borealis in the word. The community is located under the auroral oval, a band of energy that encircles the North Pole. On clear nights, when the lights are active, the skies around Fort Smith glow with green, yellow, white and occasionally a fiery red.

DARK SKY FESTIVAL

In late August each year a gathering takes place in Fort Smith and Wood Buffalo National Park to observe and celebrate space, science, stargazing and the night sky. Featured keynote speakers have included astronauts like Roberta Bondar and scientists from around North America.

VIEWING THE PHENOMENON

For a clear view, you don't need to leave Town. While the aurora can be seen from your doorstep, the local astronomical society maintains an observatory for all to use. This public space has reclined seating to ensure an unobstructed view of the sky.

Through a reservation, the society also provides guided access to state of the art telescopes and star-gazing equipment.

MIDNIGHT SUN & ALL DAY ADVENTURES

Four sets of world-class rapids stretch between Fort Smith and Fort Fitzgerald. Once a traditional portage route, it's now a zone for adrenaline seeking kayakers and a home for the annual Slave River Paddlefest. Sandy beaches in the bays surrounding the rapids offer calm waters for a cooling summer swim or a flat dry spot for sunbathing on the rocks.

WILLIAM SCHAEFER MEMORIAL POOL

Swimmer's can enjoy the fourlane 25 meter pool for a full body exercise or a low impact workout. Lane swimming is scheduled for mornings and afternoons while the evenings host public & family swims.

The shallow beach area is suitable for families, parents and toddlers and is an accessible entrance into the water.

The sauna provides a hot dry heat while the jacuzzi allows for a relaxing soak.

CENTENNIAL ARENA

The Fort Smith Centennial Arena is an exciting hub of activity all year long. The arena is home to minor hockey, figure skating, adult recreational hockey and public skating during the winter months. In the summer, it becomes an event space for the community.

CURLING RINK

The Town of Fort Smith has a thriving curling club that uses this rink throughout the winter.

MARY KAESER LIBRARY

The Mary Kaeser Library provides patrons with a quiet space to read and work. Computers, printing and laminating services are available for use along with the books, movies and games available to borrow.

PETE'S GYM

Fort Smith's sole workout facility is in the Community & Recreation Centre. Treadmills, stationary bikes, step machines, elliptical trainers, rowing machines, squat racks, press benches and other fitness equipment are available for patrons.

OUTDOOR SOCCER & WALKING TRACK

This soft rubber running track is available 24/7 for fitness enthusiasts to use. Soccer clubs frequent the inner field along with school organizations.

SQUASH COURT

All equipment is provided for patrons looking to utilize the Squash court. This facility is rentable at the front desk of the CRC.



ANNUAL EVENTS

March

WOOD BUFFALO FROLICS

The Frolics are the community's celebration of spring's impending arrival. Expect to see free-to-attend events like dog racing & traditional Dene games.

THEBACHA LOPPET

Participants journey along the extensive Trans Canada Trail between Fort Fitzgerald and Fort Smith. This event is hosted by the Fort Smith Ski Club.

ICE FISHING DERBY

Fly or ski-doo to a nearby lake to test your luck at ice fishing. Many attendees camp the weekend to compete in friendly competition.

BIG FUN SNOWBOARDING

The biggest snowboarding event takes place mid-march to commemorate a solid snowboarding season. Adults & kids are welcome to strap on a board and hit the slopes.

NATIONAL INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY

Expect a full day of activities, a free community BBQ and local entertainment. This event is partnered with local indigenous governments to celebrate cultural diversity.

AURORA OPEN GOLF TOURNAMENT

This event kicks off the golfing season with a 36-hole event at the Pelican Rapids Gold and Country Club. It offers prizes in a number of categories.

July CANADA DAY

July 1st is a grand event in the Town of Fort Smith. Partnerships between local organizations and small businesses create an event area with games, crafts and snacks. A decorative parade journey's through town, ending at Conibear Park to continue the day with live music and citizen awards.

August

SLAVE RIVER PADDLEFEST

World-class big water paddling draws an international crowd to participate in instructional clinics, river trips and friendly competition. This event welcomes all skill-levels and finishes off weekend with an evening party.

THEBACHA & WOOD BUFFALO DARK SKY FESTIVAL

This event is hosted in the largest Dark Sky Preserve in the world. For a weekend, experience science based workshops and an evening star party to celebrate all things space.

August Continued

FIREWEED FESTIVAL

The Fireweed Festival provides local musicians and artists a stage to perform in front of the community. This festival brings together musicians, vendors and community members for an evening of top-tier entertainment.

September

NORTHERN WHOOPING CRANE FESTIVAL

The Northern Whooping Crane Festival celebrates the only wild migratory population of Whooping Cranes in the world. The elusive bird is rarely seen but nests and lives in the Fort Smith region.

December

SANTA CLAUS PARADE

A long time tradition of Fort Smith are the annual Santa Claus parade. A decorated float makes rounds of the community waving to all the families as they look out the window. Fun for all.

NEW YEARS FIREWORKS

Hosted at Riverside Park, this event overlooks the Slave River and includes a spectacular firework display along with a hot-drink to keep warm.

OUR ROADS

The community is connected yearround to the NWT highway system.

RUBBER TIRE TRAVEL

Travelling by car, truck or RV is ideal if you want to see the northern landscape and wildlife. Highway 5 will lead you through the boreal forest, marshlands and Wood Buffalo National Park on your way to the Town of Fort Smith.

WINTER ROAD

During the winter, when rivers freeze, an ice road from Fort McMurray, through Fort Chipewyan, into Fort Smith is accessible.

- From Fort McMurray, AB 499km or 310mi
- From Fort Chipewyan, AB 583km or 362mi



EXPLORING THE AREA SAFELY



HIGHWAY SAFETY

- Avoid parking on the side or in the middle of the road. Use designated pull-off spots when rest is required.
- NWT roads are used by large commercial vehicles. Give these vehicles plenty of room.
- Cell-service can be weak or entirely un-available. Share your travel plans with friends and family.

WEATHER PREPAREDNESS

Depending on when you travel, make sure you dress for the weather. The cold temperatures can be dangerous, and if you have vehicle issues you may need to wait for help to arrive.

WILDLIFE AWARENESS

Animals have right-of-way. Yield to approaching animals and use caution when continuing past them.

Never approach or try to feed wildlife. It is extremely dangerous and often results in the animal having to be terminated by Wildlife Officers.

It is a good idea to carry bear spray, bear bangers or other noisemakers if you expect to leave your vehicle during transit.

Animals spotted during travel are wild. They can be unpredictable and potentially dangerous.

911 SERVICE

In an emergency, 911 service is available across the territory.


